Stirling Castle Paper Model Instructions

Stirling Castle is a historic castle in central Scotland. It was built on a rocky outcrop, on top of an extinct volcano in the 12th century. Over the centuries, many kings and queens of Scotland have lived there. It is now one of the most popular tourist attractions in Scotland.

Follow these instructions to make your own Stirling Castle replica.


You will need:

- A pair of scissors
- Some glue
- A ruler

Assembly Instructions


- Carefully, cut around the outside of all of the templates, cutting each of the solid black lines. Be sure to cut along the lines near to shapes 8, 5, 6 and 14.
- 2. Fold all of the 'dotted' lines down (to create hill folds) and all of the 'dotted and dashed' lines up (to create valley folds).

Follow this diagram:



- 3. Next, take the template with tab 1 and put the other template to one side.
- 4. Add glue to tab 1 and stick it to the top of the castle, above the doorway.
- 5. Next, add a small amount of glue to the tab that goes over shape 2 and hold it on until the glue has dried.
- 6. Finish this tower by gluing tab 3 to the other side.
- 7. On the other tower, glue tab 4 behind the wall section.

- 8. Then, add a small amount of glue to shapes 5 and 6 to attach the small tabs on top of them.
- 9. Add a tiny dab of glue to shape 7 and fold this roof section down. Stick shape 7 behind the narrow wall section.
- 10. Finally, add glue to shape 8 and fold down the tab on top of it. Now, put this template to one side and pick up the other template.
- 11. Add glue to tab 9 and stick it to the wall next to it.
- 12. Then, add glue to tab 10 on the roof section and tuck it inside the wall. Put your fingers into the castle and hold the tab to the other side until the glue has dried.
- 13. Now, on either side of the building, glue the tabs onto shapes 11 and 12.
- 14. Finally, join the two templates together. Line them up in the same way as shown in the picture below.









15. Then, add glue to shapes 13 and 14 to firmly join the two parts of your model together.

Did You Know...?

- Mary Queen of Scots spent much of her life in Stirling Castle.
- A ball from around 1540 thought to be the world's oldest football was discovered hidden behind some panelling in the Queen's chamber in the castle.
- It is thought that King James V kept a lion in the castle. The rectangular courtyard in the middle is named the Lion's Den.
